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## Occupational Employment and Wages in Dutchess County-Putnam County — May 2016

Workers in the Dutchess County-Putnam County Metropolitan Division had an average (mean) hourly wage of \$25.24 in May 2016, about 6 percent above the nationwide average of \$23.86, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Chief Regional Economist Martin Kohli noted that, after testing for statistical significance, average wages in the local area were higher than their respective national averages in 13 of the 22 major occupational groups, including protective service; education, training, and library; and healthcare practitioners and technical. No group had an average hourly wage significantly lower than its respective national average.

When compared to the nationwide distribution, local employment was more highly concentrated in 8 of the 22 occupational groups, including education, training, and library; personal care and service; and protective service. Conversely, nine groups had employment shares significantly below their national representation, including production; business and financial operations; and transportation and material moving. (1) A positive percent difference measures how much the mean wage in the Dutchess County-Putnam County Metropolitan Division is above the national mean wage, while a negative difference reflects a lower wage.

\* The percent share of employment or mean hourly wage for this area is significantly different from the national average of all areas at the 90-percent confidence level.

One occupational group—personal care and service—was chosen to illustrate the diversity of data available for any of the 22 major occupational categories. Dutchess County-Putnam County had 7,350 jobs in personal care and service, accounting for 5.3 percent of local area employment, significantly higher than the 3.2-percent share nationally. The average hourly wage for this occupational group locally was \$14.72, significantly above the national wage of \$12.74.

Some of the largest detailed occupations within the personal care and service group included personal care aides (2,900); hairdressers, hairstylists, and cosmetologists (830); and childcare workers (780). Among the higher paying jobs were morticians, undertakers, and funeral directors and fitness trainers and aerobics instructors, with mean hourly wages of \$40.74 and \$23.34, respectively. At the lower end of the wage scale were shampooers (\$9.95) and ushers, lobby attendants, and ticket takers (\$10.03). Location quotients allow us to explore the occupational make-up of a metropolitan area by comparing the composition of jobs in an area relative to the national average. (See [table 1](#).) For example, a location quotient of 2.0 indicates that an occupation accounts for twice the share of employment in the area than it does nationally. In the Dutchess County-Putnam County Metropolitan Division, above-average concentrations of employment were found in many of the occupations within the personal care and service group. For instance, hairdressers, hairstylists, and cosmetologists were employed at 2.4 times the national rate in Dutchess County, and recreation workers, at 2.2 times the U.S. average. On the other hand, amusement and recreation attendants had a location quotient of 0.8 in Dutchess County, indicating that this particular occupation’s local and national employment shares were similar.

These statistics are from the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey, a federal-state cooperative program between BLS and State Workforce Agencies, in this case, the New York State Department of Labor.

**Note on Occupational Employment Statistics Data**

A value that is statistically different from another does not necessarily mean that the difference has economic or practical significance. Statistical significance is concerned with the ability to make confident statements about a universe based on a sample. It is entirely possible that a large difference between two values is not significantly different statistically, while a small difference is, since both the size and heterogeneity of the sample affect the relative error of the data being tested.

## Technical Note

The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey is a semiannual mail survey measuring occupational employment and wage rates for wage and salary workers in nonfarm establishments in the United States. The OES data available from BLS include cross-industry occupational employment and wage estimates for the nation; over 650 areas, including states and the District of Columbia, metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs), metropolitan divisions, nonmetropolitan areas, and territories; national industry-specific estimates at the NAICS sector, 3-, 4-, and selected 5- and 6-digit industry levels, and national estimates by ownership across all industries and for schools and hospitals. OES estimates are constructed from a sample of about 1.2 million establishments. Each year, two semiannual panels of approximately 200,000 sampled establishments are contacted, one panel in May and the other in November. Responses are obtained by mail, Internet or other electronic means, email, telephone, or personal visit. The May 2016 estimates are based on responses from six semiannual panels collected over a 3-year period: May 2016, November 2015, May 2015, November 2014, May 2014, and November 2013. The overall national response rate for the six panels, based on the 50 states and the District of Columbia, is 73 percent based on establishments and 69 percent based on weighted sampled employment. The unweighted employment of sampled establishments across all six semiannual panels represents approximately 58 percent of total national employment. The sample in the Dutchess County-Putnam County Metropolitan Division included 1,602 establishments with a response rate of 77 percent. - (2) Estimates for detailed occupations do not sum to the totals because the totals include occupations not shown separately. Estimates do not include self-employed workers.
- (3) The location quotient is the ratio of the area concentration of occupational employment to the national average concentration. A location quotient greater than one indicates the occupation has a higher share of employment than average, and a location quotient less than one indicates the occupation is less prevalent in the area than average.
- (4) Annual wages have been calculated by multiplying the hourly mean wage by a "year-round, full-time" hours figure of 2,080 hours; for those occupations where there is not an hourly mean wage published, the annual wage has been directly calculated from the reported survey data.
