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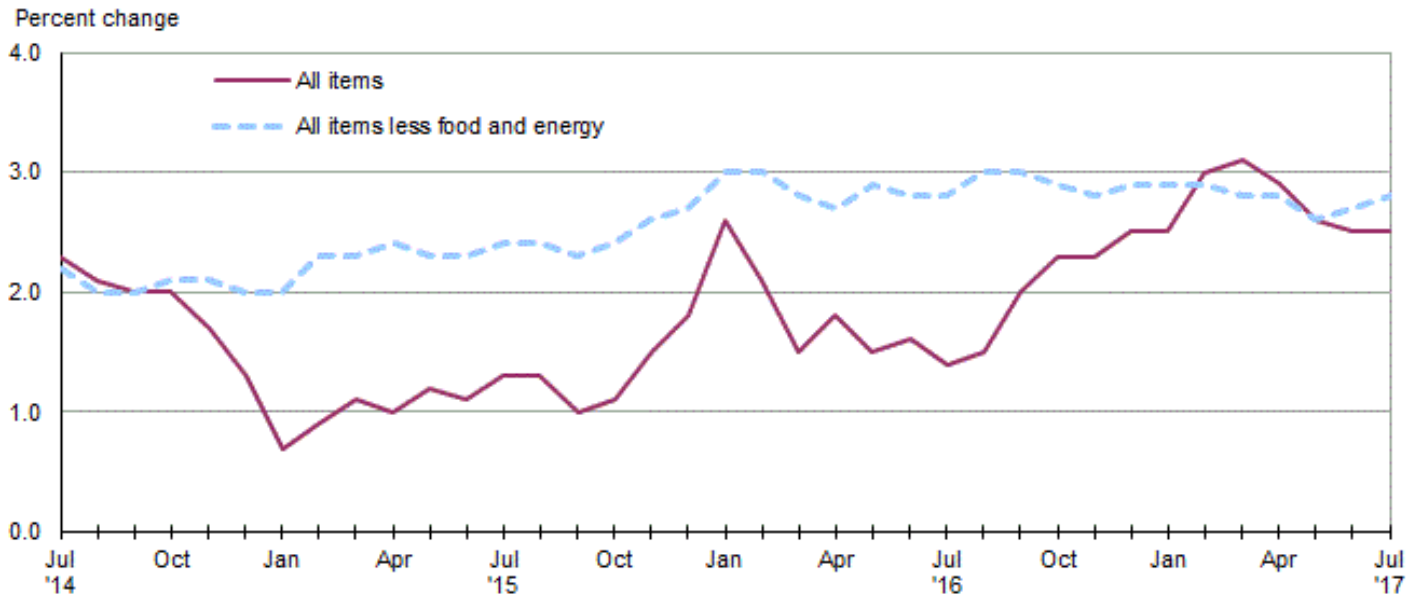
Consumer Price Index, West Region — July 2017

Area prices were up 0.1 percent over the past month, up 2.5 percent from a year ago

Prices in the West Region, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), edged up 0.1 percent in July, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See [table A.](#)) The July increase was influenced by higher prices for shelter and medical care. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, month-to-month changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the last 12 months, the CPI-U rose 2.5 percent. (See [chart 1](#) and [table A.](#)) Energy prices rose 2.2 percent, largely the result of an increase in the price of gasoline. The index for all items less food and energy advanced 2.8 percent over the year. (See [table 1.](#))

Food

Food prices increased 0.3 percent for the month of July. (See [table 1.](#)) Prices for food at home rose 0.5 percent, and prices for food away from home increased 0.2 percent for the same period.

Over the year, food prices advanced 1.4 percent. Prices for food away from home increased 3.0 percent since a year ago, and prices for food at home increased 0.3 percent.

Energy

The energy index decreased 1.7 percent over the month. The decrease was mainly due to lower prices for gasoline (-3.1 percent). Prices for natural gas service declined 1.3 percent, but prices for electricity inched up 0.2 percent for the same period.

Energy prices rose 2.2 percent over the year, largely due to higher prices for gasoline (2.6 percent). Prices paid for natural gas service increased 2.0 percent, and prices for electricity increased 1.6 percent during the past year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy inched up 0.2 percent in July. Higher prices for shelter (0.5 percent) and medical care (0.5 percent) were partially offset by lower prices for new vehicles (-1.1 percent) and apparel (-0.8 percent).

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy advanced 2.8 percent. Components contributing to the increase included shelter (5.0 percent), other goods and services (4.6 percent), and medical care (2.1 percent). Partly offsetting the increases were price declines in education and communication (-1.3 percent) and new and used motor vehicles (-1.9 percent).

The August 2017 Consumer Price Index for the West Region is scheduled to be released September 14, 2017.

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 89 percent of the total population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers 28 percent of the total population.

The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 87 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 24,000 retail establishments--department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date (1982-84) that equals 100.0. An increase of 16.5 percent, for example, is shown as 116.5. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: the price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1982-84 to \$11.65. In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. **NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.**

The West Region covered in this release is comprised of the following thirteen states: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.
